As Asia embarks on its path of economic recovery in 2022, it gets a boost in regional cooperation as the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) Agreement came into practice on January 1, 2022. The 15 member countries – 10 ASEAN (Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam) and 5 others (Australia, New Zealand, Japan, PRC, Korea) – promise to work together not only in areas of trade and investment liberalization but also in issues of regulatory coherence for better business environment.

RCEP was first conceptualized in November 2012. From the beginning, RCEP's objective was to attain a comprehensive and mutually beneficial economic partnership agreement that was expected to involve deeper engagement and improve over the existing ASEAN+1 Free Trade Agreements (FTAs). It was meant to give due consideration to the differing levels of development among the participating members. These led to many challenges during negotiation. RCEP was finally signed on 15 November 2020.

RCEP's fruition is truly pathbreaking for ASEAN. The region that embarked on the journey of regional integration through the ASEAN Free Trade Area (AFTA) in the 1990s and moved on to a more comprehensive form in 2003, i.e. the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC), has simultaneously strived to follow open regionalism by signing ASEAN+1 FTAs and more recently the RCEP. While these plurilateral agreements add an additional layer to the complexity of the "noodle bowl" of FTAs that came into being in the last decades, they also have the potential to reduce its effects depending on their coverage, depth of commitments and degree of implementation.

The RCEP Agreement contains 20 Chapters that are spread across trade in goods, trade in services, investment, movement of people and other cross-cutting issues of intellectual property, competition, small enterprises, e-commerce, among others. Though depth of each of the chapters remain debatable, the agreement includes built-in provisions and economic and technical cooperation measures that indicate possibility of improvement in the future. The agreement gets the participating countries commitment to establish a separate Secretariat, which dovetail well with willingness for implementation and monitoring progress in national economies.

To delve deeper into RCEP, the Economic Research and Regional Cooperation Department (ERCD) of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) plans to convene a high-level meeting to share the main findings of its report "Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP): A New Paradigm in Asia's Trading Architecture" and exchange views with senior government officials from RCEP member countries on the way forward in RCEP implementation.

The meeting will be followed by 2 half days of focused sessions bringing in government officials from RCEP member countries, representatives from international organizations, research institutes and business community to share and deliberate on issues of interest in the RCEP agreement. Sessions mix of presentation and panel discussions will aim at identifying key areas where further inter-governmental work is needed for a successful RCEP implementation. These will serve as main basis for further research, dissemination and capacity building activities to support ADB developing members in the negotiations and development of the RCEP built-in agenda.

The event will be of interest of a large community within ADB and its member countries, both government and businesses alike, to learn and prioritize investment and policy implementation.
